# FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

Dear friends,

The past two years have been challenging and unpredictable. The hardships of the COVID-19 pandemic and a global reckoning with racism have instilled a new sense of urgency in the fight against injustice around the world.

IARP is proud to play a role in this fight. But in the face of these challenges, it is only with the generous support of our community that we have been able to adapt and move forward as an organization. In this impact report, we share with you some of IARP's work from 2020 and 2021. Here are just a few highlights:

- We worked hard to keep our community connected through the up's and down's of the pandemic. Through our virtual and in-person events over the last two years, hundreds of people have engaged with Iraqi culture, art, poetry, music, and more.
- The impact of COVID-19 has been particularly devastating in Iraq, deteriorating an already-bleak humanitarian situation. Responding to rising food insecurity, we provided families in Baghdad with baskets of food during the holy month of Ramadan. With the support of individual donors, community partners, and volunteers, we were also able to spread the spirit of Ramadan generosity to families in the Twin Cities area.
- Through the touring photography exhibition Home of Memories, we introduced thousands of Minnesotans to their Iraqi neighbors, whose stories are often overlooked. These portraits and quotations in this exhibition break down stereotypes about Iraqis, showing we are not just numbers or stories on the news but real people with families, memories, and aspirations.

I hope you'll take a look at the successes compiled here, that you'll share in this moment of pride, and that you'll join us for what's to come.

Our sons and daughters who came to the US when they were kids are now facing new worlds and navigating how to relate to Iraq. When I think of this next generation, I'm reminded of our mission of reconciliation, of promoting peace everywhere on this planet, peace with ourselves and also with each other. It makes this world a better place to live in for us and our children.

Thank you again for your partnership in this shared pursuit of reconciliation. My best wishes to you in the year ahead.

The readings also celebrate the values that Al-Mutanabbi Street represents: free speech, the exchange of ideas, and the equality that poetry, writing, and art inherently promise.

The stories of Lafta Abduljabbar Jassim, Rasol Albayati, Eynas Alnabi, Zena Khalil, Ronak Ahmed Ali, Dhafer Abdulla, Abir Majid, and Hazha Las come together to compose a beautiful and intricate tapestry of home. So far, the photography exhibition has travelled to the Banfill-Locke Center for the Arts, the Rochester Art Center, and the Hennepin History Museum, and will continue to tour Minnesota in 2022 and beyond.

*"Home is where I feel my Arabic culture shine through."*



## SPREADING RAMADAN GENEROSITY: THE FOOD BASKET DRIVE

**100** families served in Iraq

**100** families served in Minnesota

**33** generous individual donors



With the generosity of our community, and the hard work of many volunteers, we gifted food baskets to 200 families during Ramadan in 2021. In Baghdad, 100 families received baskets containing Ramadan staples such as chicken, dates, cheese, tea, flour, rice, beans, lentils, sugar, salt, vermicelli, tomato paste, juice, and vegetable oil. Thanks to the generosity of Target, our partner Sun Market, and a private donor, 100 families in the Twin Cities also received Ramadan food baskets.



### Volunteer spotlight: Janson Kinsley

Donations of groceries from Target allowed us to serve even more families celebrating Ramadan in Minnesota than we initially hoped. Janson Kinsley, former Target store manager, Iraq War veteran, and long-time IARP volunteer, played an essential role in this partnership.
